DIGGING INTO THE BIBLE

Romans 6:20-23

When you were slaves to sin, you were free from the control of righteousness. ²¹ What benefit did you reap at that time from the things you are now ashamed of? Those things result in death! ²² But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. ²³ For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in^[a] Christ Jesus our Lord.

7. How would you describe God’s gift to you?

APPLICATION AND ACCOUNTABILITY

8. How do you get this gift?
9. What do you think of when you hear that God wants to give you a gift?
10. How can you receive that gift for you?
11. What does it mean and how does it apply that you when it says “in Christ Jesus our Lord?
12. When should you take steps to receive this gift?
13. What will happen to you when you do that?
